## Pastor Chris - The Gift of Praying the Psalms

"O come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation! Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! For the Lord is a great God, and a great King above all gods. In his hands are the depths of the earth; the heights of the mountains are his also. The sea is his, for he made it, and the dry land, which his hands have formed. O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker! For he is our God, and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand." (Psalm 95:1-7)

During my sermon on April 16, I encouraged all of us to pray with the psalms. I advised that we pick one psalm a day to read slowly and deliberately and then use that psalm in our prayers that day. I did this because the psalms contain very powerful and authentic language that we can apply to our daily lives no matter if we are happy or sad, excited, or bored, scared, or confident, mourning a loss or rejoicing in God's good and gracious care. If you ever struggle to find the words you need to tell God how you are feeling in your life, then turn to the psalms. The Book of Psalms will provide you with the language you need to deepen your prayer life and communicate well with our Holy God. There are 150 psalms in the Bible. So, pick one psalm a day and you'll have enough to guide your prayer life for five months! I'm enjoying my prayer time and I pray that God will bless your daily prayer time as well!

I selected the first seven verses from Psalm 95 for this article because we will be blessed to celebrate several wonderful milestones in the life of our youth and their families this month. These are important moments in time for our youth and their families. They are also important events in the life of First Lutheran Church. So, I felt like it is time for us to come together to rejoice and sing God's praises. Therefore, this month I invite you to come and join us as we celebrate Confirmation Sunday (May 7), First Holy Communion Sunday (May 14) and the Blessing of our Graduates (May 21). As Spring blossoms forth and we thank God for the gift of our mothers on May 14- there is a lot to thank God for this month! Join us in worship this month as together we come into God's presence with thanksgiving and sing his praises!



## Academic Study - Part 4: Church Music as Story

The Heart of the Matter: Church Music as Praise, Prayer, Proclamation, Story, and Gift by Dr. Paul Westermeyer



So many of our scripture passages are songs. Whether literal songs like the psalms, or people that burst into song because they could not contain the emotion they were feeling, these are all parts of the greater story. As I learned many times from Dr. Westermeyer in seminary, when we sing a hymn, we sing the whole story of Christ. This is one reason that it is rare for me to select one or two stanzas to sing; it is important that we include this whole story and not just the "relevant" parts. Westermeyer says of the church's hymnody: "It is partly praise, prayer, and proclamation, to be sure. But it is perhaps more profoundly story. If you lay out the hymns of almost any standard hymnal in a sequential fashion, you find the entire story of God's mighty acts there..." What a powerful and important part of our lives as worshiping Christians!

Westermeyer explains that many scripture passages are like our own lives: in the middle of a particular story, time, and place. In the midst of all of that, "[f]or the Christian, the event of Jesus stands at the center of the story and is its key." In the church, singing is the way that we retell this story, which helps commit it to memory. Music is a metaphor for worship and for a story; it "spins itself out through time," making it a most appropriate vehicle for our worship and for storytelling.

What does this mean for the church musician? At its most basic, the musician is charged with making sure that the congregation sings the whole story. Westermeyer indicates that "[t]he preacher is always compelled to apply the story to us in this moment... The cantor is more specifically responsible for the context and the fulness of the story." I appreciate Westermeyer's next section, where he says that the congregation should sing the whole story within a year. "This means that doing the same six or ten hymns over and over does not serve the people well; it keeps them from singing the whole story and omits much of the context the preacher requires for his or her words." Finding the balance between variety and familiarity is very central to what I do on a daily basis.

Finally, Westermeyer believes that "the church musician is the one who controls the pace and the shape and flow of a service more than anyone else." Through preludes, the hymns at the beginning, middle, and end, the communion music, the postlude, and the liturgical elements (both sung and spoken), the church musician takes great care and concern for the flow of worship and accompanies the people's song, enabling them to tell the story.

These notes serve to pull our service together by providing some background information about how the readings, the hymns, and prayers are connected.

With the return of offering weekly communion, this has required more folks to help in many ways - from bread baking to serving and preparation. We would like to thank the many people who have volunteered to help in these ways!

Recently Emily led a First Forum session providing a review of "A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church" by Rev. Dr. Wilda Gafney. This lectionary pulls in many different bible passages to expand biblical knowledge outside of the normal three-year Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) cycle. It follows the same format as the RCL. This lectionary is more inclusive than what many of us have become accustomed to - with passages including women and minorities. What a wonderful way to promote inclusivity in our church!


