Voice A: I will wait for coffee to brew.

Voice B: I will wait for traffic to clear.

Voice A: I will wait for fruit to ripen.

Voice B: I will wait for flowers to grow.

Voice A: I will wait for seasons to change.

Voice B: I will wait for the sun to rise.

Voice A: I will wait for you to say sorry.

Voice B: I will wait for the doctor to call.

Voice A: I will wait for the weekend to arrive.

Voice B: I will wait for my baby's first words.

Voice A: I will wait for Christmas to arrive.

Voice B: I will wait for a lot of things, but I will not wait for hope.

Voice A: I cannot wait for hope, because I want to live with hope—today and every day.
